Modesto traffic stats, forms now available online

Some days it can feel like you're sharing the road with 10,000 other cars while you're driving around Modesto. Now you can find out just how many cars are traveling local streets on the

City of Modesto's website.

The traffic flow map is one of the recent additions to the City's website. It shows the number of car trips made on certain stretches of city streets last year.

The map shows, for instance, that 36,053 cars traveled on Standiford between McHenry Avenue and Tully Road, and 39,000 trips are made down some stretches of McHenry

Avenue daily.

The map also shows traffic flow on the portion of Highway 99 that travels through Modesto.

Also new to the website is a traffic delay feedback form. The information provided by residents will help the city's Traffic Engineering staff to identify bottlenecks in the city's roadways.

Residents may use the feedback form to report issues such as traffic delays at intersections, potential accident problems or street sections that need to be widened.

If you would like to call the city to report traffic delay issues instead of using the website form, you may call the Traffic Engineering department at 577-5297.

Both the traffic flow map and the traffic delay feedback form can be viewed online at www.modestogov.com. For the traffic flow map, click on Traffic. For the traffic delay feedback form click on Traffic and then Engineering and Transportation.

Pelandale Expressway opens at McHenry



The final leg of the Pelandale Expressway opened last month, making cross-town travel to and from Highway 99 faster.

The three mile expressway extends from Dale Road to McHenry Avenue and cost \$3.7 million. George Reed, Inc. of Modesto and Fagundes & Son, Inc. of Oakdale were contractors on the project.

Nearly 100 civic leaders celebrated the opening of the expressway at a ribbon cutting ceremony last month.

Future improvement to the expressway include widening to six lanes and a bike trail addition.

Modesto uses community policing to prevent crime

Gunshots, screeching tires, barking dogs, and slamming car doors. That's the traditional view of police work, and it has its "exhilarating moments" according to veteran officer Don Watson. But these days our Modesto Police Department puts its effort toward a new type of "action." one that works from inside the community. This new police philosophy is called Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving (COPS).

"It is a philosophy. It isn't just a 'program' the police department is trying out. This is a new way of doing things,"

says Lt. David Cooperider, of the southwest area command center.

There are various elements to community policing, many of them focusing on crime prevention.

The neighborhood crime watch program is one successful element to community policing. Many neighborhoods around Modesto already have watch programs, which are mainly awareness programs. Neighborhood groups hold meetings where neighbors can meet each other's families. This way the neighbors can tell if something unusual is going on in the neighborhood.

The D.A.R.E. program is for drug awareness. Officers visit schools, give presentations, and hand out red bracelets to kids to show their pride in being drug free.

Finally, there is improved interaction between police officers and the public. The philosophy of C.O.P.S. is to get a better and more friendly link between police officers and citizens, bringing back the bond that some remember from the old idea of the neighborhood "beat cop." When passing a police officer on the street, they want residents to feel free to wave to the officers or just be friendly.

To deal with Modesto's growth, the police department decided to spread themselves out so they can react more quickly to emergencies and catch problems before they start.

They split Modesto into four main areas: Northeast. Northwest, Southeast, and

Southwest, and placed an area command station in each of these sections.

So now we have four substations in addition to the main station downtown. A lieutenant is in command of each substation which houses a tactical patrol sergeant, a station officer and

secretaries and staff. With the area of command spread out, the police can stop trouble before it begins.

Blue bags make recycling easy

Valley air district works to keep air clean this winter

To keep our air as clean as possible this winter, the San Joaquin Valley Unified Air Pollution Control District launched its winter program, Please Don't Light Tonight, last month. On winter nights when air pollution is approaching unhealthy levels,

the Valley Air District asks residents in specific.

affected areas to refrain from building a wood fire for 24 hours.

Does the program apply to my gas insert?

Because

natural gas inserts are virtually free of particulate matter emissions, curtailment requests are only for residents with wood-burning fireplaces

Why is wood smoke a problem?

Winter weather conditions such as fog can trap the toxic particles in wood smoke at ground level. These unhealthy particles can hover in the air,

posing a health risk to people and animals long after the fire goes out. Breathing these particles can reduce lung function, especially in children; aggravate heart conditions and lung diseases such as asthma, emphysema, pneumonia and bronchitis; irritate eyes, throat, and sinuses; and, even at low levels, trigger headaches and allergies.

Can one fireplace really make a difference?

Due to winter meteorological conditions, smoke collects in localized, concentrated pockets. This means that the smoke from just one fire can cause a significant problem for the entire neighborhood. Because airborne particles take time to settle, the problem intensifies quickly.

Additionally, smoke particles are so tiny that they seep into homes despite closed doors and windows. Even in homes where wood is not burned, indoor wood smoke pollution can reach up to 70 percent of the outdoor level

I don't light it often, but I don't want to give up my wood fire completely.

The Valley Air District is only asking that you voluntarily postpone having a wood fire on the eight to ten evenings when air quality is at its worst and weather conditions will trap the smoke at low levels.

When you light, please do it right:

 Install a natural gas insert or appropriately sized EPA-certified wood or pellet stove

- Burn manufactured fireplace logs
- Never burn trash, newspapers, magazines, or painted wood in your fireplace
- Build small, hot fires instead of large smoldering ones and give your fire a generous air supply
- Use only dry, seasoned wood
- Plan ahead buy green wood in early spring so it will season by winter
- Remember to have your chimney periodically inspected and cleaned professionally for your family's safety and your peace of mind

Flouride issue finalized

Modesto's City Council voted to rescind its order to flouridate the drinking water system and declined grant funding for flouridating equipment last month. The move came after Modesto voters rejected Measure M which would have flouridated the water and raised water rates by two percent to pay for the flouridation.

Measure M was opposed by 60.6 percent of Modesto voters early last month.

- · Remove all tree stands, rods, and tinse
- · Trees over 6 feet tall must be cut in hal
- No trees with flocking, paint, or fireproofing
